Radically True, Radically Healthy, Radically Loving

- Salutation (lam 1.1) Ι.

Radically True

Is James forbidding an oath in court or allegiance to your nation? No, this isn't what he's addressing. Even Jesus was placed under an oath in a court scene and positively responded, Matt 26.63-64. Is James addressing cussing or foul language. No. James forbids "two-level speech." Our yes is true. Our no is true. Such is our speech which honors God and is spoken in the presence of God.

Radically Healthy The NRSV and TNIV incorrectly render Jam 5.13 with a plural, e.g., "them pray," "them sing." The text is singular and the emphasis is upon individual responsibility to pray, praise, or call for the elders.

"anointing with oil" fails as a "sacramental action" (e.g., Roman Catholicism's "sacrament of the sick" or *extreme unction*, which was developed in the Middle Ages) for if so, there are only two mentions of "anointing" and no substantive evidence to support a sacrament.
